

WELCOME

It is good for us to be together. We gather to remind ourselves of the Gospel's call to welcome the stranger by ministering to people who are immigrants, migrants and refugees and serving the most vulnerable of God's people. We join our fierce prayers flung to our God, to protest the unjust separation of children from their parents as they crossed the border of this nation, those children and adults seeking asylum from violence and poverty consuming the homelands in which they would otherwise have preferred to remain. We join our prayers that God reunite migrant families harshly split at the border. We pray for those who continue to be held in detention centers - forgotten now that media attention has turned to something else. We join our prayers in solidarity with the strangers in our community, and all those who call upon government officials for a fair and compassionate immigration policy, that addresses the root causes of migration and poverty. Let us join our prayers in worship of God.


Glory to you, Lord.

LITANY OF THE HELD

L1: If I asked you for water, the sun is so hot, would you help?

R: God be with you

L2: If I asked you to help me find my mommy, I'm so afraid, would you help? I'm only three, I know no one here. Where is she? Why did she abandon me? Why am I alone? Where is my teddy bear? I am so frightened. It's such a big feeling for someone so small. Why don't you hold me? Why don't you pick me up? I don't understand, I can't understand.

R: God be with you

L1: This tent is not a home, fences are for animals, why are things this way for us? Did your lady of liberty not say, give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free? Did you change your mind?

R: God be with you

L2: If I asked you to help me find something to sleep on, the cement is so cold, would you help? Do all Americans sleep on floors or cots or blankets of stone?

R: God be with you

L1: I rock back and forth, all night, all day. Through the passing of the moon, the passing of the sun. Again and again, I beg of you, help me, help me, find my child.

R: God be with you

L2: Can you tell me, will you tell me? Are my parents gone forever, how can I find them in so big a place? When can I leave, when can I go? I need to find them. Why did he leave, why can't I? I have so many questions and no one to answer them. How is this going to work? How can I find them?

R: God be with you

L1: If I asked you for a real blanket, not a shiny, stiff matt, would you help? I have no mother, no father to calm my fears, a blanket wrapped around me tight, could make the night terrors go away.

R: God be with you



L2: My body shudders with uncontrolled tears. I cannot settle down, I cannot stop crying, I cannot understand why my papa isn't here. Can you not break the rules and just hold me? Every day is long and lonely, something is very, very, very wrong. Please, don't let me be so alone. Please. Can you

not see my fear? You are the grown up. You can make this right.

R: God be with you

L1: The worst heat rose from the ground, not from the sun above. I'm grateful to rest, I'm grateful for some water and food. I look to America for our safety and hope. Yet the fences in this place are like the fences on the border. I fled the cartel, its guns and machetes. I fled the poverty, the hunger and despair. The daily fear of death was too much. I came here. I fled... to America, the land of the free.

R: God be with you

L2: Am I a person or a plague to you? I came in peace, I came in hope, I came as a friend, willing to work, willing to serve as my brothers and sisters before me. My hands grow weary of holding the wired fence, waiting for your compassion. I gaze out, waiting, for my chance at freedom. To be a part of you, to help, to contribute. Will you let me? Let us?

R: God be with you

L1: Do you, hate or love? R: God be with you

L2: What is this "God be with you"? Is this your only response? Does this mean you're going to help me? Does this mean your faith is in action? Does this mean that together we will find a way to bring about the light of the Creator to all who tread in search of a better tomorrow? Are you leaving it only up to God to intervene? Does God not use us all to teach one another, love one another, be with one another, and help, one another?

R: God be with you

L1: If today you learned that the face you now see, that my true identity is Jesus the Christ, that I have been looking to see you be my hands and feet to the strangers in your midst, would you change your mind, your heart, your helping hand? Did you fail my expectations, or did you love? Did you help My children...would you help My children?

Would you? Would you? Would you.

SILENCE



Forgive us, dear God, when we keep silent in the face of this monstrous evil of the abuse of Your children. Forgive us, dear God, when we turn away too quickly. Forgive us, dear God, when we erupt in anger because we feel powerless to change the wicked actions we see. Forgive us, dear God, when we slump into despair at the evil in our world that kicks those who are already down, violently shoves away those who are fleeing violence.

Turn our hearts, O Lord, turn them toward Your love that welcomes all. Turn our hands, O Lord, turn them to serve the powerless. Turn our voices, O Lord, raise them to press the powerful toward justice. Turn us, O Lord, to love others as You love them, that Your Name be hallowed by freeing children from cages, Your will be done by reuniting migrant families, on earth as it is in heaven. AMEN

Preparation: The Children Come

The children come, not sure where they are going; Some little ones have seen their siblings die. They've traveled north—a tide that keeps on growing, A stream of life beneath the desert sky. Their welcome here? Detention, overflowing. O Lord of love, now hear your children's cry!

The children come in search of something better; They've traveled here with nothing in their hands. On one boy's belt, a number carved in leather Leads to a phone, a brother here, a plan. They come alone—or sometimes band together; They bring a plea that we will understand.

O Christ our Lord, you welcomed in the stranger; You blessed the children, telling them to stay. Be in the desert, with the tired and injured; Be at the border where they are afraid. Be on each bus where children sense the danger, As angry crowds are shouting, "Go away!"

God, let each one know justice, peace and welcome—And may your gift of mercy start with me.
For unto such as these belongs your kingdom,
And in each child, it is your face we see.
May we, your church, respond in truth and action,
And with you, Lord, say, "Let them come to me."

SIGN OF PEACE

Jesus you said to your friends, I leave you peace, my peace I give you. Grant that all of God's children may enjoy the peace and unity of your reign where you live forever and ever. **AMEN**The peace of Jesus is with each of you! **And also with you!**Let us offer each other a sign of peace and then join together around the Table of the Lord.

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

(Presider lifts paten with bread into hands and says:)

Blessed are you, God of all Creation, through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made, it will become for us the bread of life.

Blessed be God forever!

(Wine and water are poured into the chalice. Presider says:) By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity.

(Presider takes chalice and says:)

Blessed are you, God of all Creation, through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become for us our spiritual drink.

Blessed be God forever!

As we prepare to break this bread and share this cup we remember those who journey with us. For those who travel the way of the Hindus, those who follow the path of Buddha, for our sisters and brothers of Islam, for Native peoples everywhere, for the Jewish people from whom we come, for all Christians and for all others who walk the way of faith.

Holy God, accept this offering, for the praise and glory of Your name, for our good and the good of all Your people.

Christ lived and died for love. Let us remember him with this feast.

All who seek God and are drawn to Christ are welcome at God's table.

God of the Journey, accept the gifts of your church. May this eucharist help us grow in courage and faith. AMFN

Loving God, you are holy indeed. All life, all holiness comes from you. We come to thank you for your Son, Jesus for it is through him that we experience your message of total acceptance of all people, a welcome that includes everyone and invites everyone to this Eucharistic table of equals.

It was Jesus who healed all divisions and recognized You, His Father, present within all of creation. He brought to light your way of compassion and justice, helping us to understand the need to care for each other with dignity and respect.

He taught us by his life and by his death and resurrection to be true to ourselves, even if we, also, might need to give up everything as he did. For it is in our own dying, that we, too, rise to new life.

(Presider extends hand over bread and wine and says:)

So now we remember another table filled with love and thanksgiving – that of the Last Supper. Let your Spirit come upon these our gifts to make them holy so that they may become for us + the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

(Presider takes bread and says:)

It was at table with his friends that Jesus took bread and broke it, gave it to his disciples and said,

Take this, all of you, and eat it.
This is my body which will be given up for you.

(Presider takes chalice and says:)

When the supper was ended, again he gave you thanks and praise, gave the cup to his disciples and said,

Take this, all of you, and drink from it: This is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: (sung)

When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.

In memory of his death and resurrection, we offer you, Compassionate God, this life giving bread, this saving cup. May all of us who share in the body and blood of Christ, be brought together in unity by the Holy Spirit. One with the love of Christ, and joined with the love of all of us gathered here, we send prayers to all in leadership in every place of worship, especially for our Bishop Francis and all our Bishops, Lay Leaders, clergy and for all who serve the people of God.

We pray for all countries and their leaders that they may create justice and equality for their peoples; may peace come to our own country as well as to all troubled lands of our world.

We pray for all who are sick that health may soon be theirs, especially we pray for all who have died. (pause) May they be in peace and may they welcome us, one day, into the place of eternal peace.

In that new world where the fullness of your peace will be revealed, gather people of every race, language and way of life to share in the one eternal banquet with Jesus Christ the Lord.

(Bread and wine are held up as **WE** sing...)

Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all glory and honor is yours, almighty God, for ever and ever.

Amen, amen, amen. Amen, amen, amen.

Let us join hands and pray what Jesus has taught us to pray: (chanted)

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name;
Thy kingdom come thy will be done
On earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those who trespass against us;
and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours Now and forever.



BREAKING OF THE BREAD

We break this bread and drink this cup for the earth we have wasted, for those who have no bread and for ourselves in our brokenness. (Presider breaks a small piece of host & drops it into chalice saying:) May this mingling of the holy body and blood of Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it.

Jesus, with faith in your love and mercy we receive this Eucharist. Let it bring us health in mind, body and spirit.

This is Jesus the Christ who taught us how to live. Happy are we who are called to his supper.

May we receive this gift in purity of heart.

May it bring us healing and strength now and forever.

Holy Communion is a great privilege, a precious feast. And the host invites us all. "In Christ, there is no Jew or Greek, enslaved or free, male or female. All are one in Christ Jesus." (Gal 3:28) We encourage you to take your place at this holy table, for we understand and acknowledge that this is Christ's table and that this sacred meal is Christ's supper. We are all invited guests. No one is excluded. All are welcomed here!
